## **Report from the Senior Development Officer**

## Community Fridge

Summary of information:

- Data has been collected up until the end of August 2024
- You will note that at this point in the year (last data capture August 2024), we are already
  nearly at the total amount of KG distributed for 2022. With 4 months of reporting to go this is
  positive.
- However, when looking at a month by month comparison, we are redistributing less each
  month than the corresponding month last year. there are many possible reasons for this
  decline. There is less food being donated to the fridge. Supermarkets are reporting that
  more people are taking advantage of the yellow label products, meaning less makes its way
  to the fridge. There are also more initiatives offering access to free food.
- This decline is not necessarily a bad thing. The primary aim of the fridge is to reduce food
  waste. The fact that less food is makings its way to the Community Fridge, means more is
  being distributed by the supermarkets, and our primary aim of reducing food waste is being
  met either way.
- It does mean, however, that less of our carbon output is being offset, and we may see an increase from last year in our final carbon footprint.

## Weston Tree and Plant Group Meeting - Wednesday 25th September 2024 @ Weston Museum

## 1. Talk from Laura Norton - Forest of Avon Trust

The Forest of Avon Trust <a href="https://forestofavontrust.org">https://forestofavontrust.org</a> are one of England's Community Forests who work to support tree planting and improving our natural environment across the country. They work to support regeneration and growth by supporting and working together with the community, by providing funding and support, to plant trees.

They aim to increase biodiversity across the area by planting native species in South Gloucester, North Somerset, Bristol and Bath, and plant 2-4 million trees a year. This is part of the Forest of Avon Plan: A Tree and Woodland Strategy for the West of England <a href="https://forestofavontrust.org/forest-of-avon-plan/">https://forestofavontrust.org/forest-of-avon-plan/</a> from which Weston and North Somerset have specifically set goals.

The tree planted is DeFRA funded through the Trees For Climate Fund, where anyone can apply to plant anywhere from 3 tress to multiple hectares of woodland. It provides a 100% reimbursement of costs, as well as funding an ongoing maintenance grant for up to 15 years. Laura and the Forest of Avon help you access the grant by assisting with filling in the application.

You can use it to fund orchard planting, or hedgerows (if they are over 100m in length), but the most applicable area of funding is for wood pasture, which can also be used to fund street tree planting. It is also possible to apply for funding to fence off areas for natural regeneration, and the FoAt will also help you organise volunteer days.

The FoAT also run wellbeing <a href="https://forestofavontrust.org/for-people/woodland-wellbeing">https://forestofavontrust.org/for-people/woodland-wellbeing</a> and forest school events <a href="https://forestofavontrust.org/for-people/forest-school-training/">https://forestofavontrust.org/for-people/forest-school-training/</a> for people who are isolated.

Laura has been working with North Somerset Council to map and fit street trees into their application, and Gemma and Jack are concentrating their planting of street and open space trees in Weston, this year.

Laura informed the meeting that she would be comparing the National Community Forest Conference in Bristol, the next day, where they would be celebrating their 30<sup>th</sup> anniversary.

## **Big Worle**

Lynn and Donna then introduced the meeting to the Big Worle project <a href="https://bigworle.wixsite.com/mysite">https://bigworle.wixsite.com/mysite</a> which has been Local Trust funded over the past 9 years. They have donated money to build the Castle Batch SEND play area with WSMTC and have also funded education and planting in the Beckett school community garden. They are also guardians for the school gardening project.

The project is now in its last year and the Town Council are now the Locally Trusted Organisation

for Big Worle as it works to finish of its projects and funding. As part of this, they would like to create an edible trail by planting 30 fruit trees in the area covered by their funding. They are also looking to fund a green roof for the local bus stop.

They have plotted out the sites that they would like to plant their trees and are reaching out to Alliance homes and North Somerset for land permissions to plant the trees this autumn.

## 2. Overview of tree planting

NSC are aiming to plant 100 street trees in Weston, this winter, and Osprey outdoors will be helping them with the planting.

It was requested that a planting day is organised on a weekend so that other members of the group can help plant the trees. It was agreed that we could access tools at the weekend and that we would include the newsletter link in the minutes ...

The High Street trees were also discussed, and it was reported that two are thriving and 5 have been vandalised but are still growing. It was thought that one tree has not survived its damage. James reported that the funding of replacement trees has not been forthcoming, but that other avenues were being explored to replace the damaged trees.

Steve reported that he was now reporting to the Town Council's Planning and Environment Committee and that he would be presenting on the tree planting budget at the next meeting on October 16<sup>th</sup>, 2024.

## 3. We SEE Trees

Emily reported that she needs more help at the nursery and wants to create a pool of Volunteers who can be called upon to help look after the trees. Jobs will include watering, weeding and grass cutting.

She also reminded us that we are in the seed gathering season and shared the following dates for seed gathering sessions:

- Saturday 28<sup>th</sup> Sep 2-4pm @ Ashcombe Park.
- Sunday 6<sup>th</sup> October 1-4pm @ Clarence Park.
- Saturday 19<sup>th</sup> October -10 am -12 midday @ Maltlands.
- Saturday 19<sup>th</sup> October 1-3pm working party @ We SEE Trees CTN, Maltlands.
- Sunday 20<sup>th</sup> October 2-4pm @ Grove Park meet at the bandstand.

You are requested to take bags/ containers to collect seeds from the trees and then sort them into species for planting.

SC reported that at the Old Town Quarry meeting David Agassiz had explained about the unique micro-climates that exist on the site and requested that native calcareous tolerant

species such as Whitebeam, Spindle and Buckthorn are collected and grown. It was suggested that we would hold another seed collecting event in Worlebury Hillfort woods.

It was also requested that a working party is arranged with Fat Head Brewery to plant the trees funded by their sponsorship. It was agreed that this could be included in the working party at the Tree Nursery on Saturday 19<sup>th</sup> October 1-3pm.

## 4. Fundraising sub meeting

It was agreed that it was needed to have another fundraising sub-committee meeting to kick things off again. This was arranged for 10.00 Tuesday 12<sup>th</sup> November at the Bay Café in the Tropicana.

A brief explanation was provided to about how we would raise funds, including Room for Trees, where hotels will be encouraged to add a certain amount on to people's stay and this will be used for more trees to be planted (see Business Pack).

A brief review of the Creating a Community Arboretum talk that took place last week was shared, and it was agreed that it was brilliant and well attended. Steve shared that John Parker will be returning to share another talk in April 2025.

## **Tree Planting Scheme**

## **Report from the Senior Development Officer**

## 1. Purpose and Background of Report

## **Previous Resolution**

In October 2022, Weston-super-Mare Town Council resolved to earmark a budget of £10,000, to match fund money spent by North Somerset Council on trees:

## Policy and Finance Committee - October 2022

## 164. RESOLVED:

- 1. That £10,000 be allocated to tree planting from the environmental budget for current financial year.
- 2. That annual funding would be considered in line with the contribution from North Somerset Council within budget consideration up to £10,000.
- 3. To allow funds to be held by the council in an allocated fund for tree planting. (PF)

This was in recognition of the Town Council's goal of Carbon neutral by 2030, and a desire to plant 10,000 trees.

## Alternative partner

Given current local considerations, it is unlikely the North Somerset Council will be able to provide funding for new trees. As such, it has become necessary for the Town Council to find a way to approach tree planting in both an environmentally and financially sustainable way.

Following a meeting with the Civic Society, another options has presented itself. The Civic Society would like to pay for tree in certain areas (at there discretion). This would need to be understood further before any commitment could be made, as the Town Council has few viable locations for tree planting. As a suggested compromise, we could ask that they present the Town Council with a list of options annually, which would then be explored by the Town Council 's Arboricultural consultant, and then agreed in final by the Town Council via this committee.

This would then need to gain permission with NSC in regards to locations (not on our own land). The Town Council would then utilise its allocated budget for the necessary



maintenance of the trees for the first 2/3 years.

## Options for funding

There is opportunity to explore grant funding which would support the ongoing maintenance of trees.

Trees for Climate is a Defra backed grant being delivered through England's Community Forests. Trees for Climate can help fund:

- Woodlands: No maximum size, min 0.1ha per block of planting
- Orchards: 0.1ha or above, around 15 vigorous or 30 semi-vigorous fruit trees (non-commercial).
- Wood pasture: 0.1ha or above, at least 3 trees
- Hedgerows: each section must be at least 100m in length
- Natural regeneration /colonisation: considered on a case-by-case basis.

Trees for Climate can cover up to 100% of costs, including up to 15 years of establishment and maintenance payments and can support planting of feathered/standard trees, hedgerows with trees, community planting including orchards, and farm woodlands.

## 2. Options for Council

Following meetings with the Town Council 's Arboricultural Consultant, and community partners, three options have become apparent for the Town Council.

- Work with community organisations and partners, such as the Civic Society, to match fund their tree planting by way of providing the ongoing maintenance.
   This option recognises that there are other community group which may want to donate trees, as well as the Civic Society.
- 2. Plant and maintain trees within our own land . This would require using the allocated funds solely, without North Somerset Council or another organisation match funding. As this was a requirement of the original allocated funds, a decision will be required to overrule this resolution.
- 3. Alongside options 1 and 2, there is also the possibility of exploring income streams to increase budget provision. Grant funding could be available for ongoing maintenance, as well as the opportunity to provide ongoing maintenance, at a cost, for other local parishes.

With the in mind, it is recommended that a business case is brought to the next meeting to explore the options available. Both options 1 and 2 would see the Town Council being responsibility for maintenance, and as such thought would need to be



given on how this was done, but also how this would be monitored and ensure a certain standard of care was met. This would most likely be done by the Town Council's Arboricultural consultant, so his fee would be built into the ongoing maintenance cost.

## 3. Reason for Recommendation

Direction is required regarding the allocated funds for tree planting, without which the council would be unable to meet its tree planting goal.

## 4. Expected Benefits

Planting more trees would put Weston super Mare Town Council in a much better position to reach its goal of carbon neutral by 2030. Planting trees helps to increase the amount of carbon sinks (systems which absorbs more carbon than it releases), as well as enhancing biodiversity. By absorbing carbon, trees can help close the gap to carbon neutral

## 5. Implications

## 5.1. Legal

The Town Council currently has a small amount of plant able space available. It may be necessary to work with North Somerset Council on finding suitable land for planting.

## 5.2. Risks

Previous tree planting in the town has failed in certain instances due to a lack of a formal maintenance approach. Without considering the ongoing maintenance of the current and potential new tree stock, there is a risk of any planting being unsuccessful.

## 5.3. Financial Implications

Budget has already been allocated for the tree planting, however option 2 would require a decision to deviate from the original terms of the resolution. Additional means of funding would be sought to support current provision.
